## A MESSAGE FROM MOTHER MARY



*O God of unchangeable power and eternal light:  
Look favorably on your whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery;  
by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquility the plan of salvation;  
let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up,  
and things which had grown old are being made new,  
and that all things are being brought to their perfection  
by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord:  
who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God,  
for ever and ever. Amen*

On February 27, 2011 at 5 PM Bishop Alexander will come to the Church of the Ascension and preside at the service called **The Renewal of Ministry with the Welcoming of a New Rector**. He will pray the words above. I am very excited. I hope you are too. As I mentioned in January we will renew our solemn promises and vows of Holy Baptism. While I arrived November 28, this service marks the beginning and blesses the holy work we will do together.

The Bishop sent us an explanation of the service of which I would like to share a portion. "...the catechism of the Book of Common Prayer (1979) indicates that there are four categories of ministers beginning with the laity. Baptism is seen as the sacrament that initiates Christians and empowers them for ministry. As articulated by one of the pioneers of renewed appreciation of baptismal ministry, '...there is one ministry of the one body, which is Christ's ministry as exercised through that body. All vocations contribute to the efficacy of that one ministry, expressed in mission.' All baptized people-lay and ordained- participate in it according to the gifts given them. Hence, pastoral leadership and oversight both spring from and need to be celebrated within the community of the baptized.... The rite incarnates mutuality among the ministers of the Church."

In other words, we are in this business of ministry together. And it is not our ministry but Christ's ministry. God calls **all** of us to serve by following Jesus Christ and doing the work he began so long ago. Our Sunday lectionary for January 16 and 23 was about the call to follow Jesus...the call to serve God. What is your ministry? How will God 'incarnate' mutual ministry in you and your priest and your brothers and sisters in Christ? What will that look like? I believe it has unlimited potential. Did you know that in John 14 vs. 12, Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father?" Jesus promised that with God's help we will do amazing works here at this place called Church of the Ascension. Come and See!

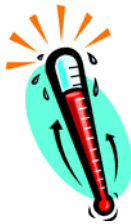
## CONGREGATIONAL HEALTH

*“He put a new song in my mouth,  
a song of praise to our God.”*

What new song is God wanting us to sing...the new song we will sing together? In a recent sermon I asked this question and I am wondering if you have given it more thought? What new song is God trying to sing through our parish family? What do we want our visitors, friends, and neighbors to see and hear when we meet them on the street or when they come to worship with us?

It was also during this sermon that I told the story about the woman who was dying of cancer. She wanted to be baptized and confirmed before she died, and she didn't have long to live. The church responded to her needs and I was fortunate to develop a pastoral relationship with her. When I asked her why she chose our church (Holy Trinity Parish in Decatur), she said, “Because of your parking lot.” Now she was not speaking of its design or access, but how people interacted with one another, their energy and enthusiasm as they were going into church. She witnessed the song they were singing. I will never forget her determination and commitment to new life in Christ and her criteria for choosing a church.

Our ability to sing God's song and relate to one another with joy has much to do with the health of our congregation. In his book *Church Wellness: A Best Practices Guide to Nurturing Healthy Congregations*, Tom Ehrich says that while “wellness in a church doesn't mean anything as simple as 98.6 degrees on a thermometer...we can discern some signs of wellness in a faith community. They include:”



- Growth in membership
- Vibrant mission work that makes a discernible difference in the larger community
- Members' lives being transformed
- Congregation able to take risks, fail without recrimination, and learn from failure
- Transparency and confidence in dealing with conflict
- Ability to deal creatively with change
- Open communications
- Members bringing their yearnings and questions to church
- Leaders willing to be guided by outcomes

Your vestry and rector are eager to work with one another and with you in a way that maximizes our health. Let us make a commitment to be a healthy congregation. I am looking forward to the song we will sing.

## PRESIDING BISHOP PLEDGES CONTINUED SUPPORT, PRAYERS FOR HAITI ON EVE OF QUAKE ANNIVERSARY

As the first anniversary of the Jan. 12, 2010 Haitian earthquake approaches, Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori has called for prayers and expresses solidarity with the people of Haiti and the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti as they rebuild.

"We continue to work with and pray for our brothers and sisters in Haiti," Jefferts Schori said in her Jan. 11 statement. "The Episcopal Church is urgently engaged in supporting the rebuilding of the cathedral complex, in addition to mission partnerships all over the nation. We hope for significant and measurable progress in the coming months in improving the lives of Haitians, helping to restore livelihoods, and stabilizing the institutions of communities and the nation."

### **Cathédral Ste Trinité**



The magnitude-7 quake destroyed 71 percent of the diocese's churches, 50 percent of its primary schools and 80 percent of its secondary schools, according to details of the Plan for the Reconstruction and Development of the Diocese of Haiti (Phase 1), which was released in early November. Seventy-five

percent of its higher-educational facilities must be demolished and 33 percent of the rectories, convents and guesthouses are seriously damaged and also must be destroyed. Also lost were the bishop's house and the diocese's income-producing condominium building.

The cathedral complex once contained Holy Trinity Music School, Holy Trinity Professional School, primary and secondary schools, and St. Margaret's Convent, a convent of the Sisters of St. Margaret as well as the church with its world-renowned murals depicting biblical stories in Haitian motifs, which were crafted by some of the best-known Haitian painters of the 20th century.

### **FINANCIAL NEWS AND NOTES**

Our final financial results for the year of 2010 were quite good, especially considering the struggles we went through one year ago to finalize our operating budget. A few key points:

We had an excess of operating revenue over expenses of \$2,022, exceeding our budget of \$1,870.

Our pledge receipts exceeded budget by \$3,564.

Our overall servant ministries expenses were \$627 less than budget.

Our administrative expenses exceeded budget by \$3,293, primarily due to building repair expenses.

Our unrestricted cash balance was \$7,346 at 12-31-10. The unpaid bills at that time were \$4,818.

The pledge campaign was a resounding success thanks to the leadership of Joe White and John Youd and the work of a wonderful team of note writers. For 2011 we have 81 total pledges for \$227,435. This compares to a total of 73 pledges for \$214,117 for 2010. We were able to provide a budget for several servant ministries that have been unfunded the past three years, and are able to pay the full 10% Diocesan commitment for the first time in three years as well. What a great accomplishment for our parish family and a wonderful start to Rev. Mary's ministry with us!

### **JUST SO YOU KNOW**

#### **WHY EPISCOPALIANS HAVE OUR OWN VERSION OF THE PSALMS?**

If the Episcopal Church is founded on worship, then it's no surprise that singing plays a very important role. And not just hymn singing, but the singing of the Psalms a well. That is why the Book of Common Prayer contains a unique translation of the Psalms called "The Psalter". It is designed for singing and chanting the Bible's greatest songs in congregational worship.

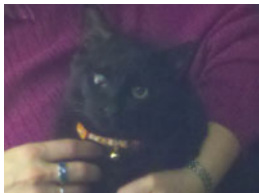
Of course, Episcopalians did not invent the Psalter. The Hebrews sang the Psalms long before Jesus walked on the earth, and there have been several translations down through the ages. However, the unique style and expertise the English brought to the Psalms have probably made the Psalter our most important contribution to Christian literature, after the English Bible and the Book of Common Prayer.

Episcopalians are also the proud inheritors of and practitioners of a unique style of singing the Psalms called "Anglican Chant". This is the incredibly rich and even breathtaking style of singing often heard by boys' (or girls') choirs in English Cathedrals and on a regular basis at the Church of the Ascension in Cartersville, Georgia. Developed some five centuries ago, it continues to enrich the worship of countless congregations.

Also, we sometimes are shuffling to find last-minute substitutes for acolytes. Needless to say, that makes for a hurried and frantic prelude to worship.



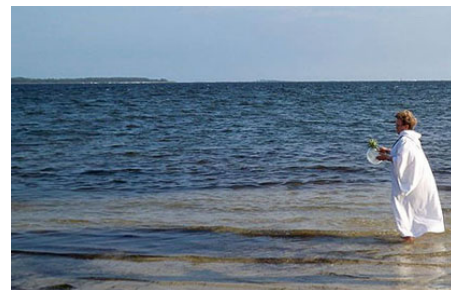
